
On these pages, our future speaks to us loudly and clearly.


Detroit is my city. You should know all the good things about my city. Detroit was known for its plants and automobiles. People from every state and country wanted a whiff of all the good money.


I slowly learned to love her again as I walked through Denby High School's doors.

You should know about the delicious Coney Islands scattered across Detroit. You should know about the delicious chili dogs or juicy hamburgers.


You should know about our beautiful cityscapes that light up the streets at night. You should know about the record-breaking Motown and the creative Detroit Institute of Arts.


My Detroit represents me through its consistency at battling slurs, comments,
